






Below shows the leaflet created by Carse and Waterhouse Animation together with some information about Pythagoras Theorem. This is an ongoing collaboration entitled "When will I ever use this?" and is the start of a number of lessons to demonstrate to students the practical use of mathematics, in this case in animation films and computer games. The first lesson is the use Pythagoras Theorem and will be available not just for Birches Head students but for students across the city.







In their art lessons, year 8 are currently taking inspiration from The Circus. Students are discussing the history of the Circus, and how artists have taken inspiration from the stories and performers.

Circuses in the 19th century were a spectacle to behold and their menagerie of performers inspired the Impressionist painters. Such performers often included giants, elephants riding cycles and daring acrobatic acts. The success of circuses in meant that by 1870 there were five permanent circuses situated in Paris and London that performed every night.

Many circus scenes have been depicted in famous paintings and stories. Seurat's 'The Circus' is one of such works. Year 8 students will be creating their own sketchbook pages in the artist's style.

The past few weeks Year 8 have been discovering **Spanish** speaking countries in their Spanish lessons when learning to talk about past holidays. We have discovered the many places around the world that speak Spanish, making it the second most spoken language in the world.



During LP1 learning year 8 **History** students watched the 2012 London Olympic opening ceremony which showed the changes to Britain during the Industrial Revolution.





Year 9 have been learning about pre-war Jewish life and the events of the Holocaust in RE during this Learning Programme. They have been following the story of Leon, Else and Barney Greenman, a Jewish family who lived in Europe before WW2. More information can be found about their life here:

During their lessons in the last few weeks, the Y7s, 8s and 9s currently doing music as their aspire subject have been very lucky to have had some unique opportunities with our City Music Service. The City Music Service now provide music lessons in school for students that choose to opt in to our in-house Performing Arts School.

In these special lessons, our specialist teachers have brought in instruments for students to hear, see, and even try to play! Some of our students might not have had the opportunity to see, hold or play one of these instruments before so this was an amazing opportunity for these students to try out something new before choosing whether or not they would like to opt into this opportunity. Students learnt how to hold their instrument correctly and learnt how to make a sound – some of our Y7 students even played along with our visiting brass teacher Mr Walker to the theme from 'The Fresh Prince of Bel Air'.

Well done to everyone who attended!






Six of our year 10 and 11 food technology students attended Stoke College's Big Buffet event on Tuesday night.
